



What the VPK 80/20 Rule Means

Under Rule 6M-8.621, Florida Administrative Code, the Voluntary Prekindergarten (VPK) Education Program requires that:

- A **child must attend at least 80%** of the instructional hours in a month for the provider to receive **full reimbursement** for that child.
- If attendance falls below 80%, the provider's reimbursement is reduced proportionally.

How It Relates to Enrollment & Reimbursement Reports

Each month, VPK providers submit **enrollment and attendance data** through the Early Learning Coalition (ELC) or state portal.

- The **Enrollment with Reimbursement Report** tracks how many children are actively enrolled and how much the provider will be paid.
- The attendance percentage (based on sign-in/out records) determines whether the provider receives full or partial reimbursement.

Example:

- A child is enrolled for 20 VPK instructional days a month.
- The child attends for 16 days (80%).
 The provider receives full payment.
- If the child attends only 14 days (70%),
 The provider's reimbursement is reduced accordingly.

Absences and Documentation

For VPK:

- The 80/20 attendance rule automatically accounts for absences.
- Doctor's or hospital notes are not required for absences.
- Unlike School Readiness programs, VPK does not allow extra paid absences beyond what's covered under the 80/20 threshold.
